Will / going to

Here are some ideas you can use to practice "will" and "going to" with your Pre-intermediate students. Some students find it difficult to understand why there are so many ways to express the action in the future. These activities are suitable for group and one-on-one classes (a teacher will be a partner) and are aimed at developing speaking skills.


